Editor's Corner: Am I an Artist Yet?

Have you reached the moment in life that you realize that you are an artist? For most of us, that moment is a hard one to reach - we often underestimate our efforts. A whole lot of effort, and I still haven't made it to the top of my game. However, I'd like to suggest that when we take a (colored) pencil to paper; you have started **and** you have arrived. Both start at the same time.

Like many of you, I have read and re-read the journals of Vincent Van Gogh. I have revisited these journals many times until I finally understood Vincent's simple quest - he wanted to be an artist. In his early life, he was surrounded by great works of academic art in galleries where he worked. He started to practice, hoping to mimic the paintings he saw - after all, these were recognized artists and if he followed their path, he would surely become an artist. Lucky for us, he didn't make it, he failed - he thought - many times, but he learned from it. Something miraculous happened to Vincent along the way. He never reached those ideals of academic art that he held in his mind. Something even more wonderful happened - he became his **own** artist.

Our show has 39 pieces of artwork, and these artists are each on their way to creating their *own* art. I saw that number and wished for 40 pieces in our show. The diversity of these artworks gives me great joy - some so detailed, others shining in beautiful color and imagination. All of them produced by people who love art and make art - that's what brings us together. Check them out on our website for a better view. Now, take a look at your art journey - what is holding you back from submitting? In an artist's journey no one piece of artwork will define you -- it's a body of work that tells your story. Vincent's work shows his progression - Frank Duveneck's work is generous and shows his life's journey - a story well told. A body of work made over time will tell your story, and define your art space in this world. So, consider being number 40 next time around for our annual exhibit.

This issue will feature two member artists in our chapter: Autumn Huron and Karen Brydon. Consider telling us your story too, I'm thankful that Autumn and Karen are in this issue. Let's find out a little bit about each other and who we *are* -- as artists - by following our history of life and art.

Autumn Huron: A Colored Pencil Artist

Autumn first took pencil to paper when she was a child. A piece of paper was a treasure to her, something that she covered with drawings to enjoy over and over again. Her love of making art expanded to theatre scenery design in school, and she spent many weekends in her church illustrating hymns and painting background scenes for two baptisteries.

Autumn has lived in Toronto, Canada and while there she was elected president of the Clarkson Art Group, arranging for members to exhibit at the Canadian National Exhibition. She also participated in other local shows and even had her first one-woman show. Autumn traveled from Canada to Eastern Europe doing chalk drawings and illustrating hymns in various churches.

In 1976, Autumn relocated to Canton, Ohio and began her own art group. She developed clientele for her unique style of pen and ink drawings of homes, businesses and historical buildings. In 1984, she moved to Cincinnati and became a member of several art groups, including the Cincinnati Woman's Art Club and Colerain Artists. She is a charter member of DC119 and served as our president in early years.

Autumn was interested in colored pencil, but really got excited about it when she took a three-day workshop with Vera Curnow, Founder of CPSA International and DC119 member. She saw the many ways one could use the medium to produce many effects. She uses Prismacolor and Caran d'Ache pencils as well as watercolor pencils. Her goal is to make her work look as smooth as oil paints.

She's always amazed when a painting works. A recent watercolor almost painted itself, finished in a few moments and fulfilled the vision she had imagined. It became a Christmas card. Her one hope for her work is that it creates beauty and enjoyment for those who view her paintings. Her favorite mediums are colored pencil, watercolor, acrylic, pastel and pen and ink.

Karen Brydon: A Colored Pencil Artist

Karen has always loved horses. She made her first drawing of a horse when she was two and half years old - her mom still has it! When she was about 10 years old, she went on a field trip to the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C. On her way to see *Mona Lisa*, she was taken by a portrait of a horse by an early English artist, George Stubbs, c. 1762. His horse portrait, called *Whistlejacket* was inspiration - she set about painting a copy for herself which now hangs over her fireplace at home.

Her love of art stayed with her during her college years at the University of Maryland. Starting off as an art major, she was unhappy with the focus of the art world at the time and switched her major to P.E. and health and law enforcement. After graduation, she joined the U.S. Secret Service which led to a 24 year career as a Special Agent. While on assignment in New York, she visited every gallery she could she knew she would come back to art one day. In 2000, she retired from the Secret Service, now in Louisville, KY and joined an oil painting group - her urge to draw and paint had come back to her.

In 2003, she took a colored pencil workshop from Vera Curnow and became hooked on colored pencils.

In Vera's workshop, she learned to love the detail that an artist can get with colored pencils - more so than oil painting. She continued to learn and grow with other workshops offered by Lisa Ann Watkins, Linda Lucas Hardy, Cecile Baird, and others. She follows Jason Morgan and Bonnie Snowden on YouTube for more instruction and tips.

Karen loves to draw and uses Faber Castell Polychromos, Derwent Lightfast and Luminance colored pencils. She has started to experiment with pan pastels and pastel pencils. She considers herself an animal artist, her subjects mostly consist of horses, dogs and wildlife. She currently is showing pet portraits at Gallery 104 in LaGrange, KY.
